My dear Macmillan

I shall be at the School
Committee on Tuesday, & we
shall doubtless meet. I noted
that you had quoted me in
your letter to the press re
P.R. & I wish it had been
to more purpose. I am quite
in favour of sketching the point
in regard to the proposition of
new donations to go towards
P.R. I don't feel anxious,

however, to apply to Armon.
He has done rather too much
for me of late; and, furthermore,
I could not raise his interest
much in Crete, when on the spot.
This, as I have often said to
Evans, - Crete is rather caviare
to the general public. To appre-
ciate his extraordinary interests
in antiquities, you must
know a good deal beforehand.

I rather wish A.G. would
drop his little hints, in spite
of his 'Mausoleum'. The chances
against much being learned

from their graves are very great.
To find museum-lore of the second
third order would be all very
well for students of the B.S.A.
but Evans is wanted for more
difficult pioneer work. If he
has really finished his Palace,
which I doubt, I wish he
would set to work seriously
on his publications thereof. His
behaviour must be: but I mean
to tell him my views candidly
when I see him.
